➤ Bachelor academic degree; ➤ Passing the unified national master's exam; ➤ Enrolment in the program without passing the master's exams is possible according to the rules established by the Ministry of Education and Science of Georgia; ➤ Passing the internal university exam in the speciality (ancient literature, ancient Greek language, Latin language) and foreign language; ➤ Examination issues and conduct procedure will be published on the ATSU website - atsu.edu.ge, at least one month before the beginning of the exams; ➤ The applicant who presents an internationally recognized certificate proving knowledge of a foreign language at the B2 level, or the person who has completed a bachelor's or master's educational program in the relevant language, will be exempted from the foreign language exam; ➤ Enrolment in the program is possible through external and internal mobility.

Objectives of the Program:	
The goal of the master's program is to train highly qualified specialists in classical philology. Students will: ➤ Get deep, thorough and systematic knowledge in classical philology: the history of ancient Greek and Latin languages; ancient poetry; ancient epic; lyric about drama, prose and related linguistic and literary competences; ➤ Develop the ability to analyse the peculiarities of life and work of ancient Greek and Roman authors, artistic and conceptual characteristics of literary works, the importance of ancient literary tradition, problematic issues of ancient literature and classical languages, philosophical-world-view aspects of the ancient era; ➤ Develop tolerance, respect for cultural diversity, recognition of democratic principles, protection of professional ethics and academic integrity, ability to adapt to the work environment.	
Learning Outcomes (General and Sectoral Competences):	
Knowledge and Understanding	Graduate: ➤ Demonstrates deep and systematic knowledge of ancient epic, lyric, drama, prose and linguistic, linguistic and literary issues related to them; ➤ Determines the style of ancient Greek and Latin texts, the main directions of the reception of the ancient epic, the stages and features of the development of the history of ancient Greek and Latin languages, phonetics, morphology, syntax and ancient metrical verse.

Skills:	Graduate: ➤ Searches for relevant sources and literature in libraries and electronic scientific databases, identifies, classifies and systematizes them; ➤ Reads ancient Greek and Latin texts of various contents and thinks critically in the literary, historical and cultural context; ➤ Discusses the historical and cultural foundations of the ancient tradition, the peculiarities of the works of ancient Greek and Roman authors, the ways of the historical development of the Greek and Roman languages and formulates argumentative conclusions; ➤ Analyzes the artistic and conceptual features of the selected work, their literary-historical and cultural significance, philosophical aspects of the worldview of the era; ➤ Produces research work with innovative approaches based on original ideas while adhering to the principles of academic integrity and contributes to the development of field knowledge.
Responsibility and Autonomy	Graduate: ➤ Respects cultural diversity, different opinions, democratic principles and human values; ➤ Adheres to professional ethics, adapts to the work environment and demonstrates the ability to work in a team.

Teaching Methods

- Group or individual counselling;

- Student's independent processing of the material and presentation of thoughts/discussion on the relevant topic;

Student Knowledge Assessment System

At LEPL Akaki Tsereteli State University, the assessment of the academic performance of students of higher educational programs is carried out using modern indicators according to the principles determined by the Order of the Minister of Education and Science of Georgia No. 3 (01.05.2007) and the Resolution of the Academic Council of Akaki Tsereteli State University No. 5, (17/18) 15.09.2017 .

The assessment system at Akaki Tsereteli State University is divided into the following components:

- Out of the total evaluation score of the educational program component (100 points), the share of the mid-term evaluation is 60 points, which, in turn, includes the following evaluation forms:

Student activity during the semester (including various components of assessment) - no more than 30 points;

- Midterm exam – not less than 30 points;
- Final exam - 40 points.

The student with a total competency score of not less than 18 in midterm assessment components is allowed to take the final exam.

The system of assessment recognizes:

a) 5 types of passing grades:

- a. a) (A) excellent –91-100 points
- a. b) (B) very good – 81-90 points
- a. c) (C) good – 71 -80 points
- a. d) (D) satisfactory– 61-70 points
- a. e) (E) sufficient– 51-60 points

B) two types of negative assessment:

b. a) FX (unsatisfactory) - 41-50 points out of the maximum grade, which means that some more work is required to pass and the student has the right to retake the examination once after independent study.

b. b) F (fail) – 40 points out of the maximum grade or lower, meaning that considerable further work is required and the student has to study the module again. In case of receiving FX in the educational component of the program, an additional exam will be scheduled in no less than 5 days after the announcement of the final exam results.

The minimum grade obtained by a student in the final exam has to be 15 points.

The number of points obtained by a student in the final exam is not added to the additional exam result.

The additional exam provides the final result and is reflected in the final assessment of the educational component of the program.

Considering the additional exam result, in case of getting 0-50 points in the final grade of the educational component, the student will be given the grade F-0.

Additional criteria for assessing student achievement in the training course are defined in the relevant syllabus.
